

Pantomime Blanche











Key Vocabulary	<u>Definition</u>
Pantomime Blanche	A French art form in which an actor, with a painted white face, creates and interacts with invisible objects.
Exaggerated facial expressions, gestures and reactions	Using the face, hands, arms and body in an enlarged and heightened way. This acting is non-naturalistic , meaning NOT how you would act in real life.
The Moment of Contact – The "TOK"	Responding with your hand, to an invisible object when you "touch" it, to demonstrate its weight, shape and size to the audience.
Tension and resistance:	Tensing up your hands or other body parts can clearly demonstrate "The Moment of Contact".
<u>Creation of invisible</u> <u>objects:</u>	Combining the above skills whilst being clear and detailed using mime.
